# **Parklet Concept Discussed at Joint Meeting**

The continued use of up to 14 street parking spaces for outdoor dining and other functions throughout the year has been a subject of interest for residents and business owners for some time. There has also been interest in improving the temporary nature and appearance of orange and white barricades surrounding outdoor patios. To address this, the City's engineering contractor Wade Trim introduced the concept of the parklet at a joint meeting of the City Commission, Historic District Commission, Planning Commission and DDA on February 15.

In essence, a parklet is a more permanent structure for an outdoor patio that extends into a street parking space.

The meeting was informational in nature. No design work or cost estimates have been put together. A number of variables, such as natural gas, water and sewer connections, and overhead moveable sunscreens would affect final pricing. The parklets would remain as public property and could be used during the off season for other uses, such as additional scarecrows, ice sculptures or outdoor markets.

Several residents and business owners spoke in favor of developing parklets to increase both the

size and perceived safety of outdoor patios. Others spoke in opposition, concerned that non-restaurant businesses would suffer from the loss of on-street parking.

"I find this to be a very compelling vision for the City of Plymouth," said Mayor Nick Moroz. "It speaks to the vibrancy and connectivity that we want to maintain in the downtown and Old Village.

The City Commission plans to seek further input from residents and other stakeholders prior to making a decision whether to move forward with the project.

# **February Police Training**

# Paid Parking to be Studied

The City of Plymouth has adopted a five-year strategic plan which includes deciding on a direction for paid parking. This decision relates to the goal of sustainable infrastructure and meets with the key objectives of financial modeling, technology, infrastructure, and changing vehicular habits.

City staff last researched paid parking options just prior to the pandemic's beginning, which put the project on hold. At its February 7 meeting, the City Commission approved a resolution directing staff to collect updated information and prepare a final report of the for the City Commission to review, prior to sending to other boards and commissions for comment.

# Library Creative Lab Re-Opens


The Plymouth District Library has re-opened its creative lab, a space which includes two 3D printers, a large format printer, a Cricut cutter and six computers with the Adobe Creative Suite. The creative lab first opened in February of 2020, shortly before COVID-19 required the library to temporarily close its doors.

The Adobe Creative Suite is a collection of more than 20 powerful programs for graphic design including Photoshop, Illustrator, and Lightroom. Students and designers can access these typically subscriber-only tools for free in the library's creative lab.

The 3D printers, which will be operated by staff, can print objects up to 7 inches square (7x7x7). Users submit items to be printed by emailing their design to print@plymouthlibrary.org.

The large format "poster" printer has a roll of paper that is 36 inches wide and 1200 inches long. Patrons may submit designs to be printed on the large-format poster printer to print@plymouthlibrary.org. Staff will advise patron of the cost of the job before printing, and patrons may pick up the poster once completed.

Currently, the creative lab will be open for the public to use on Thursdays only. Additional days and tools will be added over time as staffing allows and new tools become available.

# Ruth Huston-Whipple Award for Civic Engagement

The Ruth Huston-Whipple Award for Civic Engagement is named in honor of Ruth Huston-Whipple, Plymouth's first female elected City Commissioner (1934-1949), first female mayor of Plymouth (1940-1942) and first female Wayne County Board of Supervisors member.

The purpose of the Ruth Huston-Whipple Award for Civic Engagement is to honor a community member who, like Ruth Huston-Whipple, has positively impacted the quality of life in the City of Plymouth through his or her exceptional civic and/or philanthropic engagement.

Nominees must meet the following eligibility criteria:

- Person must have demonstrated civic and/or philanthropic engagement within the City of Plymouth. Examples of impact should show a community benefit, delivered with integrity and perseverance
- Married couples can be nominated
- Past Ruth Huston-Whipple Award recipients, current members of the Plymouth City Commission and full-time employees of the City of Plymouth are not eligible to be nominated

The Ruth Huston-Whipple award winner will have demonstrated engagement, leadership and achievement over a period of time and in one or more of the following areas:

- Contributed to the City of Plymouth above and beyond reasonable expectations
- Demonstrated character, commitment and/or leadership qualities
- Actively participated in community or civic organizations whose sphere of influence falls within the City of Plymouth
- Exemplified accomplishments and contributions to the economic vitality and/or residential quality of life in the City of Plymouth

The nomination period opens January 1 and closes April 30 of each year, when a selection committee comprising two mayor-appointed City Commissioners and a representative from the City of Plymouth administration will select and notify the winner(s). We need volunteer coaches for the league to run!



## **Home Owner Financial Assistance**
