Ice Festival

The world-class Plymouth Ice Festival returns to Downtown Plymouth for its 41st year February 3 through February 5. This year's event will feature more than 100 ice sculptures, live carving, interactive sculptures, a petting zoo and much more!

"The Ice Fest is one of our signature events," said Mayor Nick Moroz. "We've experienced frigid weather and weather where the sculptures melt. We've had rain, snow, sleet, you name it. The fantastic organizers always find a way to make it happen."

Once again, the Ice Festival has partnered with the Plymouth Downtown Development Authority for the Ice Festival Bingo scavenger hunt game, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Plymouth. Visitors can grab their bingo cards from any of the locations and collect stickers from locations all over town to be eligible to enter a contest drawing. To be eligible for a Grand Prize drawing, contestants must fill the entire board. Visitors can learn more about the popular scavenger hunt at www.downtownplymouth.org.

Local service clubs will be collecting \$10 for parking in most municipal lots, with funds going to community projects and initiatives.

Main event hours are Friday 5-10 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m.-10 p.m. and Sunday 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Sculptures are expected to remain for viewing after the main event hours, weather permitting. For more information on the Plymouth Ice Festival visit www.plymouthicefestival.com.



Public Art Installations Throughout the City

The addition of many new art installations can be expected this year throughout the City. The Plymouth Downtown Development Authority has partnered with Tony Roko's Art Foundation and Community Financial Credit Union to expand the Plymouth Art Walk in the downtown area. Two new paintings were added to the CFCU building in December, and eight additional pieces will be added to walkways near the Central Parking Deck. Residents and visitors can expect to see the new artwork in April, with a



ribbon cutting taking place in conjunction with the Spring Artisan Market on April 22. Adding artwork is part of the DDA's five-year Strategic Plan.

In addition to the Plymouth Art Walk, the DDA is also partnering with the Detroit Institute of Arts in 2023 to bring the Inside Out program back to the City of Plymouth. Ten high quality reproductions from the museum will be placed around the City this May. The locations of the paintings will span from downtown to Old Village, and also to the Plymouth Community Arts Council property. This program is intended to increase connectivity between downtown and Old Village, a key objective in Goal Area Four of the City's Strategic Plan. The Inside Out program installations are expected to be available for viewing between May and October of this year.

Strategic Plan

Last year, the Plymouth City Commission hammered out goals and one year tasks for a new five-year strategic plan. The major goal areas they selected are sustainable infrastructure; staff development, training and succession; community connectivity; and attractive, livable community.

This month, they will meet to review the previous year's progress and set new one-year tasks for the administration to tackle.

The sessions are facilitated by Dr. Lew Bender, an organizational specialist, who has been working with staff and elected officials here for eight years. "Dr. Lew brings a unique perspective to help guide us in our vision and how to get there," said Mayor Nick Moroz. "The City Commission is a diverse group of people, and we sometimes don't start out on the same page. With Dr. Lew's help, by the end of the sessions, we're pretty much there."

January Police Training

Western Wayne County Special Operations Team Training

Many wildlife are well adapted to living near people and as they become accustomed to humans they may cause conflicts. An example of this is the now-famous turkey on Main St. and Ann Arbor Rd. Crosswalks

Please remember that both drivers and pedestrians need to be active participants at crosswalks. Drivers should be cautious when pedestrians are in the area, and pedestrians must wait for traffic to clear before entering a crosswalk. At the Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) crossings, such as the one mid-block on Main St. across from Kellogg Park, pedestrians should activate the light after traffic clears, then enter the crosswalk. Drivers who approach after the pedestrian has entered the crosswalk are to stop until the crosswalk is clear. The crosswalks at the major intersections downtown are pedestrian leading, meaning that the walk signal activates several seconds before the traffic light, providing a visibility cushion. At these intersections, the walk signal is only activated on the next cycle when pedestrians push the button.



Block Parties

With the frigid temperatures we've been experiencing, it's hard to imagine that we'll be socializing outside again soon! Nonetheless, block party applications have begun to roll in. If you are interested in having one, you may find an application on our website under forms and documents, or you may call 734-453-1234 extension 203 to receive an application by email. Here are a few things to remember.

- The Department of Municipal Services provides barricades for the organizers to place in the street. Only the official barricades provided by the City may be used to close the access to the street.
- Block parties are intended to promote camaraderie among neighbors. Graduation parties, birthday parties, and the like do not fall under this description. Organizers should notify and receive approval from a majority of residents on the block prior to submitting an application.
- Parties must end no later than 10 p.m. and must be controlled as to noise so that neighbors will not be unduly disturbed.
- An 18-foot wide fire lane must be maintained open to emergency vehicles for the entire length of the closed street. Picnic tables, barbecue grills, and other portable equipment which can be readily moved if necessary may be placed in the closed street in the area outside of the fire lane. Fire hydrants shall remain accessible. No open fires are permitted in the closed street.
