PCC Accessible Restroom Phase II Underway



Before you know it the Plymouth Cultural Center's restroom construction project will be complete and all facilities will be ADA compliant. Phase one, on the meeting side of the building, was completed in July, and phase two, on the arena side, is nearing completion.

"Making the restrooms accessible has been a priority for a long time," said Recreation Director Steve Anderson. "As is often the case, though, money was an issue. We are so grateful for the state and federal funding procured by our representatives Matt Koleszar in Lansing and Haley Stevens in Washington. Without their help, this project wouldn't have been possible."

News in Brief

In an effort to help control future water rate increases and reduce potential instances of lower water pressure, the City of Plymouth is implementing voluntary water use restrictions this summer. If you choose to water your lawn, please do so between the hours of 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. If there is a delay feature on your dishwasher or washing machine, please also set the timers to operate during non-peak times. The Great Lakes Water Authority uses peak-time usage when determining a community's water rates, so following these guidelines will help keep our water bills down.

The next shred and electronic recycling day
will be on Saturday, October 1 from
9 a.m. to noon at Plymouth Township Hall,
9955 N. Haggerty. This event will
be open to all City of Plymouth and Plymouth
Township residents. Each vehicle may bring up
to five file-sized boxes or paper bags for
shredding, as well as a variety of electronic
devices.

Since the bottle filler was installed at
City Hall, the equivalent of 17,512
disposable bottles have been
replaced by refillable containers. The
City of Plymouth has also installed
bottle fillers in the fire department
and at the Plymouth Cultural Center.
