Citizen Group Working on Redistricting

In September of 2020, the State of Michigan seated a group of randomly-selected citizens to redraw U.S. Congressional and Michigan State House and Senate district lines. The lines are redrawn every 10 years following the U.S. Census to accurately reflect their population. Prior to a vote that amended the state constitution in the November 2018 general election, legislators gerrymandered the lines, sometimes to benefit special interests. The commission is composed of 13 randomly selected Michigan registered voters: four who affiliate with the Democratic Party, four who affiliate with the Republican Party, and five who do not affiliate with either major political party.

In March, Sue Hammersmith, the director of the Michigan Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission (MICRC) attended a Plymouth City Commission meeting to provide an update. She said the group plans to begin holding public hearings in May throughout the state to inform and to seek out information from the citizens. The public hearing nearest to Plymouth will be on Tuesday, June 8 in Novi. The time and venue have not been announced.

After the first round of public hearings, they will hire experts to draw the maps, then hold eight more public hearings before the redistricting is finalized.

The MIRC has a deadline of November 1, which could prove difficult with the census results being delayed until September 30 and the group being mandated to have a 45 day comment period prior to adoption. They are petitioning the Michigan Supreme Court to extend the deadline.


Spring Cleaning Inside and Out

It seems that spring may have sprung early this year! The Department of Municipal Services trucks have been switched away from road salt (fingers crossed) and are now moving a mountain of mulch around the City. Soon, the street sweepers will be fired up.

Compost pickup will begin on April 5 on your regular trash day. Any City of Plymouth resident or business may utilize the compost collection program. Items out for compost must be placed in a paper lawn refuse bag or a can marked for compost. The compost container may be marked with an "X" or identified with a "compost" sticker available at the Municipal Services office. Compost includes grass clippings, leaves, branches, and yard debris. Compost does not include sod, dirt, rocks, dog poop, or potted plants.

Spring clean up will take place on Saturday, May 1 for homes north of Ann Arbor Trail and on Saturday, May 8 for homes south of Ann Arbor Trail. Spring clean up is a single day collection that allows for large items and extra trash to be picked up from the curb. Automated trash carts will not be serviced on this day and no recycling or compost will be collected.

Brush chipping is a year-round service and allows for the disposal of larger limbs and branches at the curb. No city bags or tags are required for brush pickup. Additionally, there is no need to notify Municipal Services of limbs at the curb. Brush chipping is not available to tree contractors. The schedule is based on the area map below. Area A receives service during the first week of the month, Area B receives service during the second week of the month, Area C receives service during the third week of the month and area D receives service during the fourth week of the month. Brush must be placed out by 6:00 a.m. on the Monday of your service week.



Fountain Construction to Begin

At long last, construction on a new Kellogg Park Fountain will begin this spring. The Wilcox Foundation has agreed to pay \$1.19 million for the design work, site preparation and construction of the fountain and the DDA and City will contribute \$50,000.

"We couldn't be more happy that this project is ready to break ground," said Mayor Oliver Wolcott. "Once again, the City administration and electeds have turned to collaboration to get things done. The fountain will be around for us, our children and our children's children to enjoy."

Construction is expected to begin in sometime this spring and last through the fall.

Police Department March Training

- Western Wayne County Special Operations Team Training. Team members attended the required regular monthly training sessions involving the many skills needed to successfully intervene during a critical incident situation such as a hostage rescue or barricaded gunman. These skills include: proper planning and response, firearms and equipment proficiency, team movement, surveillance, and much more.
- Western Wayne County Mobile Field Force Team Training. Team members attended regular quarterly training session involving maintenance of skills necessary during civil disturbances. Skills included proper command and control techniques, tactics, communication, and equipment proficiency.
- Eastern Michigan University's Center for Regional and National Security School of Police Staff & Command Executive Leadership Program. One of our sergeants continued in this 9-week program. This is an intensive program consisting of 350 hours of classroom instruction that requires out of class study, preparation of papers, projects, and examinations. The experience takes the officer beyond traditional operational methods and incorporates strategic thinking and creative and innovative problem solving skills for current and future law enforcement executives paving the way for further advancement to senior leadership positions within the department.
- Defensive Tactics Instructor Recertification Training. One of our defensive tactics instructors completed his triennial recertification requirement in Pressure Point Control Tactics (PPCT) Management Systems. PPCT is based in tactical, legal and medical research.
- Pistol Training/Qualification. One of multiple annual firearms qualification and training days.

Rotary Partnership Aids Downtown

The Rotary Club of Plymouth recently partnered with the Plymouth Downtown Development Authority to help local businesses struggling because of the pandemic by infusing \$10,000 into the local economy. The Plymouth Rotary Foundation supported the Shamrock on the Shelf scavenger hunt throughout downtown Plymouth, giving \$25 gift cards purchased from participating businesses to put money directly into the pockets of small business owners.

“The Rotary Club of Plymouth sponsored the scavenger hunt to support local businesses that have supported our club and efforts for decades,” said John Buzuvis, club president. “Much like our club, the local businesses are woven into the fabric of the community and our support of them is critical during this unprecedented time.”

Participants used their cell phones to scan QR Code clues on colorful shamrock displays in businesses. After scanning, a clue appeared to begin a trip through downtown Plymouth to find similarly colored shamrocks in stores or in storefront windows. Each shamrock unlocked another clue to the next location. With the eighth clue, participants were able to register to receive a \$25 gift card. With 32 businesses participating, and with the Rotary club committing up to 400 gift cards, that’s an average of \$312 per business.

“The scavenger hunt was an opportunity to provide a free, family friendly activity in our own community, raise awareness about Rotary and support our local businesses by directly purchasing gift cards from them,” added Buzuvis.

Not only did the shamrocks have clues to the next stop on the route, they also had information about the Rotary Club of Plymouth and Rotary International. The club is hopeful that many who participated in the scavenger hunt learned about how the Rotary supports the Plymouth community, supports the club’s events, or maybe even join Rotary after seeing how the club supports the community.

As the pandemic has caused a year of financial instability for most business owners, Plymouth Downtown Development Authority chairperson and the owner of her own downtown Plymouth business, Agio Spa di Reposo, Kerri Pollard says the Rotary Shamrock on the Shelf scavenger hunt not only put money into the pockets of those fighting to stay in business, participants are noticing businesses they haven’t visited before.

“I am so appreciative of the Rotary Club’s generous donation to downtown Plymouth businesses, as both a business owner and DDA board member,” said Pollard. “It has been a difficult year for all of us and to have happy, excited people coming into our spa looking for shamrocks and engaged in finding out what DTP (Downtown Plymouth) has to offer is great. We had old friends and lots of new potential guests of all ages find us over the past week.”

The event took place from March 12 to March 28.





Ruth Huston Whipple Award

The Ruth Huston-Whipple Award for Civic Engagement is named in honor of Ruth Huston-Whipple, Plymouth's first female elected City Commissioner (1934-1949), first female mayor of Plymouth (1940-1942) and first female Wayne County Board of Supervisors member.

She was a 1913 graduate of Plymouth High School and later worked as a teacher and debate coach at the school. She fought against school policies that discriminated against married women and eventually left the district in protest. She remained, however, a leader in the Plymouth community, championing the improvement of inhumane conditions at a local juvenile detention center and addressing environmental and beautification concerns in the City.

As an elected official, Ruth Huston-Whipple organized the first city-wide refuse collection system in Plymouth, served on the Zoning Board and represented Plymouth in the Michigan Municipal League. She was a tireless volunteer leader of local organizations such as the Plymouth Historical Society, Plymouth Woman's Club, Plymouth Garden Club, Plymouth Business and Professional Women's Club and Plymouth Canteen Club's War Service Committee.

Though disabled at a relatively young age by a series of strokes, she remained an example of selfless dedication to the community and leadership on issues both profound and practical improved life for every resident of Plymouth during her tenure.

The purpose of the Ruth Huston-Whipple Award for Civic Engagement is to honor a community member who, like Ruth Huston-Whipple, has positively impacted the quality of life in the City of Plymouth through his or her exceptional civic and/or philanthropic engagement.

Nominees must meet the following eligibility criteria:

- Person must have demonstrated civic and/or philanthropic engagement within the City of Plymouth. Examples of impact should show a community benefit, delivered with integrity and perseverance
- Married couples can be nominated
- Past Ruth Huston-Whipple Award recipients, current members of the Plymouth City Commission and full-time employees of the City of Plymouth are not eligible to be nominated

The Ruth Huston-Whipple award winner will have demonstrated engagement, leadership and achievement over a period of time and in one or more of the following areas:

- Contributed to the City of Plymouth above and beyond reasonable expectations
- Demonstrated character, commitment and/or leadership qualities
- Actively participated in community or civic organizations whose sphere of influence falls within the City of Plymouth
- Exemplified accomplishments and contributions to the economic vitality and/or residential quality of life in the City of Plymouth

The nomination period opens January 1 and closes April 30 of each year, when a selection committee comprising two mayor-appointed City Commissioners and a representative from the City of Plymouth administration will select and notify the winner(s). Unused Drug Collection Service Restored

The City of Plymouth's drug collection service, which is intended to reduce the amount of unneeded medicine in residents' homes, decrease prescription drug abuse, and keep drugs out of our waterways, was temporarily suspended during the COVID-19 pandemic. The service has been reinstated.

The City of Plymouth's Drug Collection Unit is located on the main floor of City Hall. Drugs can be dropped off with no questions asked.

This service is available Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. For security purposes, the box is locked, so please stop at the police counter to check in your items for disposal. You must remove pills from their bottles and place them in plastic bags for disposal. Only pills in plastic bags or blister packs will be accepted. We do not accept liquids, needles, creams, inhalers or any other type of medication.

COVID -19

HOW WE'RE KEEPING YOU SAFE

We've taken extra steps to provide you transportation services you need in a safe environment. In this new reality, you'll notice some changes in how we provide transportation:

UPON YOUR RIDE:

COVID-19 symptom daily screening for staff.

COVID-19 symptom screening for riders prior to their ride. Every rider must be free of COVID-19 symptoms, COVID-19 diagnosis and must not be waiting for COVID-19 test results.

FACE MASKS:

A mask covering the nose and mouth is required at all times. The CDC does not recommend using one-way valves or vented masks as they do not prevent the transmission of COVID-19. Anyone wearing these types of masks will be asked to cover them with a standard ear-loop mask.

PROPER PPE:

Face masks, face shields and gloves are provided to our staff members. Each bus is supplied with disinfectant spray and hand sanitizer.

CLEANLINESS:

We continue to regularly clean and disinfect all our buses at the beginning of each shift, multiple times throughout the day and again at the end of each shift.

APPOINTMENT SCHEDULING:

Appointments are staggered to minimize the number of riders on the bus at any given time.

SOCIAL DISTANCING:

Abide the 6ft Social Distancing to the best of your ability. We will transport the maximum of three riders at any given time to allow for social distancing. Riders will sit in the same seat both ways.
